Dear Friends.

Tuesday morning we were asked to be one of the host sites for the *College for Congregational Development*. This intense program, happening all this week at St. John's Cathedral, is designed for adult Episcopal leaders from the surrounding area. I believe they had students from 5 different states this year. In short, they are learning TONS of practical ideas for how to become transformational agents in their own Episcopal home parishes.

Being a "host site" means that our church was selected to be one of the few local churches the attendees visited on Tuesday for their immersive field experience. As such ten visitors came to learn how to identify things that are working (and not working!) in real live parishes. They gathered here to study the intricacies that go into the model called "Gather, Transform, Send." That is what parishes do (or don't do). We gather as a people, we are transformed by God's Word, and we are sent into the world to do good.

Sometimes it helps us to stand outside our own parish and hear from others gathered for the same purpose. Thus several parishioners (15?) gathered with about 10 students from the College for two hours to exchange our stories, histories, and hopes. As usual, Marie Mitchell had coffee and goodies and Jean Baker presented a homemade cake, which of course underscored the well-known warm Resurrection welcome.

This is why I want to brag. That morning I arrived hoping we could be of help to the visiting students. What I went away with was nothing short of awe at what God is doing with *us*. I looked around our parish and saw us through our visitor's eyes. Beautiful pictures taken by our resident photographer, Richard Chan, pervaded the

Back to School Drive


